Undaunted volunteers tackle mammoth task

Concorde G-BBDG is uncovered at Brooklands

THE Brooklands Museum Concorde has emerged from its temporary hangar so work can be completed on rebuilding the supersonic aircraft.

Volunteers from the museum are undertaking the mammoth task of repainting the specially prepared panels using paint supplied free by PPG Acrospace.

Progress

The front fuselage section is now relitted to the mainframe and the rear fuselage is next on the agenda.

The outer wings still have to be carefully positioned and fitted and then the Concorde will be lifted on giant air bags so that its elegant giraffe-like undercarriage can be added.

Signature feature

During the next few weeks the aircraft's signature droop nose will be gracing the front end once again.

By the end of September, contractor ASI will have completed its work and Brooklands volunteers will be left to manage and complete the project.

They will be working on the interior during the winter months and it is hoped visitors will be able to inspect the heart of the flying wonder early next year.

Essential item

One critical item still missing from the nearly complete shopping list is a set of Concorde steps so people will be able to climb on board.

Like all Concorde aircraft, the Brooklands example, registered as G-BBDG, was 60 per cent manufactured at Brooklands before being
